

STATEMENT REGARDING CONFLICT MINERALS:

HOT PEPPER MOBILE, INC. (referred to as: HP) adheres to the vision of "becoming a healthier and longer-lasting enterprise", upholds to the concept of sustainable development as one of the core values of the company, and fulfills its social responsibilities with due diligence. The responsible sourcing philosophy of HP's mobile phone manufacturers have been fully integrated into the business activities of the entire supply chain. HP will be committed to social responsibility ethics and work with manufacturers to promote the sustainable development of the supply chain.

HP promises:

- 1) Attach importance to the issue of conflict minerals, and resolutely do not purchase, use or support conflict minerals.
- 2) Comply with relevant laws and regulations on conflict minerals (including but not limited to Section 1502 of the US Dodd-Frank Act) and standard guidelines of industry organizations (OECD, RBA, GeSI, etc.), and require manufacturers and their Subsidiary suppliers do not use conflict minerals.
- 3) HP strengthens supplier management, and requires manufacturers and suppliers to carry out strict investigations on conflict minerals through supervision and inspection, identify and trace the source of raw materials, ensure the legality of metals used or contained in HP products, and prevent them from originating from Congo (Kinshasa) and its neighboring countries and other conflict areas (Note 1), do not use "conflict minerals" from conflict areas (Note 2).
- 4) Respect human rights and continue to pay attention to the implementation of ethical procurement of conflict minerals in the supply chain.

Note 1:

Conflict areas: Republic of Congo (DRC) and neighboring countries: Congo, Sudan, South Sudan, Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi, Tanzania, Zambia, Angola, Central African Republic, etc.; Announced by the U.S. Secretary of State in the future, includes some or all of the above countries or all the new international and regional areas.

Note 2:

Conflict minerals include but are not limited to rare metals such as cassiterite, wolframite, coltan, gold and its derivatives from the Democratic Republic of the Congo and its neighboring countries, as well as any armed forces controlled areas in the above-mentioned countries, including tantalum (Tantalum), tungsten (Tungsten), tin (Tin), gold (Gold), cobalt (Cobalt) concentrate, or its derivatives and other minerals, or any minerals and their derivatives that cause financial conflicts in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and its adjacent countries or regions thing.
